NEMS ADJUSTS TO PANDEMIC

There are new cosmetic changes in the corridors and throughout the building at New Ellenton Middle STEAM Magnet School.

On the front door of the school, there is a sign that reads, "Masks must be worn." Also at the front door, teachers greet students as they pass the threshold. Hand sanitizer is given to students upon their entry into the school. Students either go to the cafeteria for breakfast, or they go directly to their first period class.

On the corridor floors are large dotted arrows that are spaced 6 feet apart. The arrowed dots line each side of the hallway. They are a constant reminder to

students to remain 6 feet apart and to walk on the right side of the hallway.

Other noticeable changes that are seen throughout the school include no locker or water fountain usage.

The original water fountains that require students to push a lever just to drink water are encased in plastic bags. Instead, there are touchless water fountains near the restrooms and in the cafeteria. Water bottles or nalgenes are simply placed underneath the spouts and water trickles down into the containers.

Inside the classrooms, hand sanitizer stations have



There was a display of books celebrating Hispanic Heritage available for checkout in the library as well as an online collection available through Schoology.


Students were encouraged to participate in the "Hispanic Heritage Flags and Independence Day" worksheet for their chance to win a prize.

The NEMS Library kicked off the 2020-2021 season of Battle of the Books in September. Several students signed up and discussion groups started in October.


There are 10 books on the Battle of the Books reading

The Art Department is bustling with much excitement this year! In sixth grade art Dr. Fontanez, the art teacher, taught her classes about the elements and principles of art.


Students had to create a *Zenspire* design with sharpies and watercolor paints.
