The policies set forth in the following Code as adopted by the Aiken County Board of Education apply to all students of The Consolidated School District of Aiken County. (Elementary Principals have broad discretion in the application of this Code due to the developmental nature of their students.) This Code applies to summer school students and students in the adult education program.

INTRODUCTORY MATTERS

I. Philosophy: The Aiken County Board of Education believes that citizens desire the best possible education for their children. A positive learning environment is safe, drug free, and without disruption. Good student conduct is essential to the achievement of the school's goals and objectives. The Code of Student Conduct establishes guidelines for students, parents, teachers, and administrators to maintain an appropriate school environment.

Disciplinary action is best resolved among teacher, child, and parent in a calm, reasonable manner. However, serious violations of the Code must be handled quickly and effectively by the Administration. The objective of disciplinary action is to increase maturity and acceptable behavior by the students with every reasonable effort being made to keep students within the school's influence. To insure the welfare of the greatest number of pupils requires the dismissal of any pupils who fail to observe the required standards.

II. Legal Authority for Discipline in South Carolina: The regulation of student conduct and discipline in South Carolina schools is derived from the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended; from Regulations of the South Carolina State Department of Education; and by specific precedent and opinion.
