Akins In Action!

Easiest-Ever 15-Minute Shrimp Scampi Recipe courtesy of "thekitchen.com"

YIELD: Serves 4

PREP TIME: 8 minutes to 10 minutes COOK TIME: 5 minutes to 7 minutes

INGREDIENTS

1 1/2 pounds raw wild jumbo peeled and cleaned shrimp (tails left intact)

6 cloves garlic, divided

1/2 teaspoon tightly packed fresh parsley leaves and tender stems

1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes

3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided

1/2 cup tightly packed fresh parsley leaves and tender stems

4 tablespoons butter

1/2 cup dry white wine

1/2 medium lemon

INSTRUCTIONS

If using frozen shrimp, thaw the 1 1/2 pounds overnight in the refrigerator, or place the shrimp in a colander and run under cold water for about 10 minutes. Pat the shrimp very dry with paper towels.

Thinly slice 3 of the garlic cloves; set aside. Grate the remaining 3 cloves and place in a large bowl. Add the shrimp, salt, red pepper flakes, and 1 tablespoon of the olive oil and toss to combine. Coarsely chop the 1/2 cup of parsley and set aside.

Heat the remaining 2 tablespoons oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat until the oil pulls to the pan edges. Add the shrimp-garlic mixture and sear undisturbed, for 2 minutes. Flip the shrimp and cook until opaque and just cooked through, 1 to 2 minutes more. Transfer the shrimp to a serving platter.


Add the 4 tablespoons butter to the skillet and swirl around the pan as it foams. When the foaming subsides, add the sliced garlic and stir to coat in butter. Add the 1/2 cup white wine and juice from the 1/2 lemon and simmer until reduced by half, 1 to 2 minutes.

Stir in the chopped parsley, then immediately pour the mixture over the shrimp on the platter. Serve as-is, or with cooked spaghetti or crusty bread.

RECIPE NOTES

Make ahead: The shrimp can be marinated 1 day in advance and refrigerated.

Storage: Leftovers can be refrigerated up to 2 days.

FBI agent Emmy Dockery is absolutely relentless.


She's young and driven, and her unique skill at seeing connections others miss has brought her an impressive string of arrests.


But a shocking new case — unfolding across the country — has left her utterly baffled.
